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Welcome to Chemistry! Throughout the year, we will discover what our world is made of, how it is put together, and what happens when different parts of our world interact with each other. Most importantly though, we will discover **WHY** these things happen.

No matter what your exposure to chemistry has been or how you have done in science classes in the past, I believe that <u>all</u> of you are capable of fully understanding the world around you. All you have to do is turn your S.W.A.G. on; S.W.A.G. is my expectation for students during instructional time. It means, Sit up straight, Watch the teacher, Ask and answer questions, and Get it done. Working together as a team, I can guarantee your success throughout the duration of the school year.

• **Big Goal:** Chemistry is a mandated course for all college-bound Apollos. As your student's Chemistry teacher I have set goals for us to work towards to ensure that students develop the appropriate level of analytical and critical thinking skills to ensure that they are prepared for college or the career of their choice.

My first goal for my students is for them to demonstrate 85% mastery of the Chemistry content. In order for us to accomplish these goals we must work together and efficiently. In order for us to work together, I need all students in class every day. My second goal for this year is 100% attendance. Chemistry is not a course in which reading a text book can reveal the full understanding. In order for us to achieve our goals, students must be present with their S.W.A.G. turned on EVERYDAY. My third goal for my students is to score at least a 500 on the SAT II

Chemistry by the end of the year. With recent changes to testing in Texas, chemistry no longer has a STAAR exam. In place of this, we will be preparing for the SAT II (subject test) in Chemistry, an approved college readiness exam.

- **Materials:** The following items you **must** have with you in class *every day* in order for us to meet our goals for the school year. If there any issues supplying the items under "You Provide", please see me as soon as possible, but no later than August 30th, 2013
 - I Provide:
 - 1. Daily handouts
 - 2. In-class folder
 - 3. Scientific Calculator (If you want one for home, we use the TI-30X IIS Calculator [\$15.00] in class)
 - You Provide:
 - 1. 2' Binder [For all Classes, given to you by SHS]
 - 2. Loose-Leaf Notebook Paper
 - 3. Writing Utensil (Blue, Black Ink Pen, or Pencil)
 - 4. A positive attitude and an inquisitive mind ©
- Assessments and Grading: Students will have some sort of assessment daily, whether it is a discussion, exit ticket, homework, quiz, or unit exam. At the end of each semester, students will be given a comprehensive final exam that assesses the Chemistry TEKS, Texas Essential Knowledge of Skills, which will determine 25% of their final grade for the semester. The following breakdown determines how you earn your Chemistry grade for each of the 6 week grading periods.

At the end of the semester, your three marking period grades (25% each) will be averaged with your semester exam (25%) to calculate your semester grade.

Grading Policy

- Makeup Work: Students that are absent must go to the makeup work bin before school, during lunch, or after school to receive make up work. You may also go during independent work time provided you have finished the required work for the day. DO NOT DISRUPT CLASS to try and obtain make up work. Makeup work needs to be turned in by the end of a grade submission period (3 week progress reports or 6 week report card). Makeup work not turned in by the end of a grade submission period will be given a grade of zero and will not be allowed to be made up.
- **Retest:** You are responsible for studying for all exams; you should not wait until after a test or a quiz to request help. In order to retake an exam, student must attend at least one tutorial on Tuesday evening before taking the assessment over on their own time.
- **Homework:** Homework will be placed in the homework bin on the pickup table at the beginning of each class period from the evening before. Homework turned in after the warm-up is LATE! Late homework will be placed in the special bin labeled "Late Work" on the front table. Late work will

be stamped with the date turned in, will receive a 10% deduction for each day late, and may not be turned in more than 1 week after the original due date.

Classroom Expectations

We adhere by the 5 P's in this classroom. They are:

1. **Be prompt**

By the time the last bell rings, you should be in your seat **SILENTLY** working on the Do Now

2. Be prepared

The only way we can succeed in this class is through preparation. Come to class ready to work. This means you must bring your required materials and your full attention to class each day.

3. **Be productive**

Stay on task. We are busy in this class! I need each and every one of you to give 100% effort, 100% of the time

4. Be polite

We respect each other. There will be NO BULLYING in this room.

5. **Be positive**

We have the "I CAN" attitude in this room....probably because we are AWESOME!!! Be confident and take academic risks. This means that it's ok to be wrong since it helps you to learn. We can learn as much, if not more, from our failures than our successes.

You can expect the following things from me:

- 1. **I will respect you B**ecause **I** respect you and believe in your ability to succeed, **I** will challenge you and hold you to *high expectations*.
- 2. **I will be responsible for helping you to learn.** I will prepare engaging lessons, give meaningful feedback, and stay on task and on track, just as I expect you to. I will not waste your time.
- 3. **I will respond to you.** I will answer your questions the best I can, listen to you, and not give up on you if you get confused or frustrated. We are in this together.

Hand Signals

We have several hand signals in this class to help figure out what we need:

Student Signals:

- 1. Hold pencil up in air \rightarrow means that you need to sharpen your pencil
- 2. Crossed fingers \rightarrow means you need to use the restroom
- 3. Raise hand \rightarrow to ask an answer questions

Teacher signals:

- 1. Knocking motion → means YES
- 2. Sideways hand wave → means NO

Rewards

Our class system will include rewards, both individual and whole class. Students will earn class dollars based on different actions they carry out. These can be related to attendance, performance on exit tickets/unit assessments, and coming in for tutorials. With these class dollars, students can purchase homework passes, small items, and extra credit.

Students can also earn points towards classwide rewards. These will be determined based on the student/teacher points. For each significantly positive behavior/action for students, they will earn a point. For each mishap, the teacher will earn a point. Rewards will be given based on the teacher-student

differential at the end of each four days, with the reward being given on Friday. Additionally, greater rewards can be earned based on class performance on exit tickets and unit assessments.

- **Electronic Devices:** My classroom is a learning environment. There is absolutely no reason to have out a cell phone, head phones, iPod, mp3 device, or anything else with an on/off switch. All electronic devices will be confiscated and turned into your assigned Dean's office on the first offense. Consider the syllabus your warning.
- Food/ Drink: Good science safety practice restricts the consumption of food and/or drink to
 outside the classroom. Students will be asked to dispose of all food/drink items upon entering the
 classroom.
- Academic Dishonesty and Plagiarism: Academic Dishonesty includes talking with classmates during independent work (daily work or tests), copying someone's answers on tests and assignments assigned as independent work, and/or plagiarism of someone else's work. Academic Dishonesty and Plagiarism WILL NOT be tolerated in the class at all. Any evidence of academic dishonesty or plagiarism will result in the immediate failure of the assignment and a referral to your Dean.

If you are caught with an assignment for another teacher's class during my instructional time, I will confiscate that assignment and turn it in to the appropriate teacher.

• **Consequences:** When class procedures and policies are broken, I have the authority to assign consequences as seen fit per action. The consequences for this course are as follow:

- 1. Verbal Warning [Document stating that student has been warned placed in front of student]
- 2. Fill out reflection [Teacher turns warning document over indicating that student should fill out the document]
- 3. Call Parents & Teacher Detention
- 4. Office Referral
- Academic Support: My role as your teacher is to help you be successful in this course. Please remember that there is one of me, and I have over 150 students. Thus, it is imperative that if you are having trouble in my course you come to me when you need help. I am available every day before school, at lunch, and Monday and Wednesday afternoon for tutorials. You must secure a tutorial pass from me to be allowed to my classroom during lunch and to allow me time to prepare.

If I feel that your success in my class is in jeopardy, I reserve the right to assign you to lunch tutorials, after school tutorials, or Saturday Enrichment Academies to ensure your success.
